Fly Around the World in the Graf Zeppelin

"The Harbinger of Peace, Prosperity and the Brotherhood of Generations"

The Experience of a Lifetime

Enjoy a unique journey Around the World via Graf Zeppelin," with a FREE showing of this rarely seen documentary. The non-profit Lighter-Than-Air-Society will present the film at 11 a.m. on Saturday,

June 12 at the Main Branch of the Akron-Summit County Library downtown.

Restored by UCLA for its 1993 film festival, the travelogue captured the first circumnavigation of the globe by an airship. The lengthy leviathan traversed the Atlantic Ocean, and was the first aircraft to cross the Pacific Ocean. The 776 Ft. German dirigible visited the Cleveland Air Races during the Aug. 8 to Sept. 4, 1929 adventure.

William Randolph Hearst financed about half the cost of the MGM movie that premiered in New York City on Nov. 2, 1929. Lady Drummond Hay, the only woman aboard, traveled with 18 other passengers and crew of 40 to report exclusively for his newspaper chain. She became the first woman to cross the Pacific Ocean and fly around the world.

Exciting scenes from the rigid airship are among the first aerial images of the planet. U.S. Navy Commander Charles E. Rosendahl describes each leg of the voyage before the landscape moves across the
screen. Rosendahl, who accompanied the crew, was eventually put
in

charge of the flight trials of the USS Akron at the Airship Dock in

1931 and then assumed command of the dirigible on 40 flights, until June 1932.

Backed out of the hangar, the huge ship first soars from Lake-hurst, N.J., to Friedrichshafen, Germany, under the command of Dr.

Hugo Eckener, "The Magellan of the Air." The magnificent Art Deco interiors of the enormous gondola take center stage, displaying comfort and style. Sipping chilled champagne, passengers swing to "Singin' in the Rain" in jazz on a modern phonograph.

Proudly, the aircraft roams above the major German cities. Views of Berlin and Potsdam are thrilling, as seen before the ravages of World War II bombs. The journey continues across immense Russia, and the endless "ocean of timber" of the Steppes, to Siberia and to Tokyo. The emperor of Japan presents a great ceremony of welcome.

Flying above a typhoon, they are the first to span the Pacific Ocean, crossing the International Dateline to reach San Francisco, and the majestic silver fish then glides to Los Angeles.

Finally the Graf Zeppelin travels over the Rocky Mountains, southwestern deserts, Chicago, and Cleveland to sail above the Statue of "Lady Liberty" in New York and land again at Lakehurst. The great ship circled the world in only 12 days of flying time.

The library is located at 60 S. High Street and parking is FREE in the adjacent deck. Take a seat for the experience of a lifetime.
