### About our Speaker

Michael was appointed President and CEO of the Ohio Aerospace Institute (OAI) in January, 2007. Prior to OAI, Michael had a distinguished career in the United States Air Force, retiring at the rank of Colonel in July 2005.

A distinguished engineering graduate from the U.S. Air Force Academy, class of 1975, Michael received a master's degree in flight structures from Columbia University on a Guggenheim Fellowship in 1976 and a doctorate in aerospace engineering from the Air Force Institute of Technology in 1986.

His Air Force service includes engineering and program management duties in the F-15, C-17 and Advanced Cruise Missile program offices. Michael was Deputy Director of the Astronautics Laboratory, Commander of the Phillips Laboratory and Arnold Engineering Development Center, Commandant of the Air Force Institute of Technology, and Special Assistant to the Commander of the Air Force Research Laboratory. He served in two Air Force acquisition centers, four defense laboratories, a test center, a major command staff, the Office of the Secretary of Defense, and the faculties of the Air Force Academy and Air Force Institute of Technology. As Director of the Air Force Research Laboratory's Propulsion Directorate, he oversaw facilities valued at more than \$2.1 billion and led the efforts of more than 1,000 scientists, engineers and staff.

## **Bryan E. Rayner**

The lighter-than-air community lost a true friend and tireless advocate when Bryan E. Ohio, passed away sud-

denly on Thursday, Sept. 19, 2013, at his home.

Mr. Rayner, along with his wife, Theresa, operated a mobile museum dedicated to the history of the Shenandoah airship, which crashed in Ava in 1925. He was a collector of its memorabilia, including pieces of its wreckage, and he was a well-known local historian who promoted the history of the Shenandoah and the Ava community.

He was a member of The Lighter-Than-Air Society, Navy Lakehurst Historical Society, and the Naval Airship Association. He enjoyed hosting July Fourth celebrations at his home, and the Ravners were instrumental in organizing commemorative events in Ava on major anniversaries of the USS Shenandoah and in preserving the memory of the U.S. Navy's first rigid airship and her crew at the Noble County wreck sites.

Bryan was born May 4, 1957, in Cambridge, son of Evelyn Marie Bryan Rayner of Ava and the late Wilfred Ellis "Shine" Rayner. He was a 1975 gradu-

ate of Shenandoah High School and the Guernsey-Noble Vocational School's auto mechanic program. He was the third generation owner and operator of Rayner, age 56, of Ava, Rayner's Garage and Towing in Ava, which was founded by his grandfather, Boots Rayner in 1929. Together with his father, Shine, they operated the family business until his father's death December 1, 2006. He was always on call to help at the time of an accident or vehicle breakdown at any time of day or night, holidays, in blazing heat or in freezing cold. He was dedicated to his work. He provided towing services for demolition derbies, and decorated his tow trucks and participated in local

## November in Buoyant Flight History

Nov. 2 1931 - The USS Akron makes its first flight as a commissioned ship of the US Navy, from Naval Air Station Lakehurst, New Jersey.

Nov. 3 1897 - 1st all-metal rigid airship designed by David Schwarz is tested in Germany, using wafer-thin aluminum but crashes soon after take off.

Nov. 4 1910 - The British non-rigid airship City of Cardiff, built by E.T. Willows, completes the first ever dirigible flight from England to France.

Nov. 8 1836 A coal gas-fired balloon piloted by Charles Green lands in Weilburg, Germany, a day and 448 miles after having departed London.

Nov. 11 1935 Orville Anderson and Albert Stevens establish an altitude record for balloons of 72,395 feet in the Explorer II.

Nov. 12 1903 - The 1st fully practical airship, the Lebaudy, makes a successful flight in Paris, France. The 190-footlong airship flies 38.5 miles, achieving a speed of 25mph.

Nov 13 1980 - Double Eagle V, piloted by Rocky Aoki, with Ben Abruzzo, Larry Newman and Ron Clark, lands in California's Mendocino National Forest 841/2 hours after taking off from Nagashima, Japan, becoming the first balloon to cross the Pacific Ocean.

Nov. 21 1783 - The first untethered human flight takes place when Jean Francois Pilatre de Rozier flies as high as 500 feet and travels five miles over Paris in a Montgolfier hot-air balloon.

Nov. 21 1917 - The Zeppelin LZ59 begins a 4,198-mile journey through Africa in 96 hours.

Nov. 25 1924 - First Lady, Mrs. Calvin Coolidge christens the ZR-3 (LZ-126) as the USS Los Angeles at NAS Anacostia near Washington DC.

Nov. 30 1784 - Jean-Pierre Blanchard makes the first scientific observations from above the earth in a hydrogen balloon over London.

Nov. 30 1905 - The experimental Zeppelin LZ2 was damaged on its first attempt to launch. It made its first flight two months later but was damaged bevond repair after an emergency landing.

## Lockheed Martin Airdock Guided Tour



This year's Silent Auction will give you the "once in a lifetime" opportunity to visit this iconic building.

The Akron Airdock was built by Goodyear in 1929 for the construction of the USS *Akron* and the USS *Macon.*. Later on it was used to build non-rigid airships and other aerospace products.

The Airdock is 1,175 feet long,

325 feet wide and 211 feet high. Its 364,000 square feet of floor space without interior support posts—is the largest uninterrupted area ever built under one roof.

Its height is equal to a 22-story building. It can cover two Washington Monuments laid end to end.

Spherical doors at each end are the most unique feature.

## **Auction Item**

One guided tour of the Lockheed Martin Airdock for up to four people, including a trip to the 'Top of the Dock' (weather permitting). Restrictions apply

## **Restrictions:**

- All persons must be at least 18 years old
- All persons must be US citizens
- No food or drink permitted in Airdock
- No cameras (pictures by Lockheed Martin)
- Will occur at mutually agreeable time
- Good for up to one year

The two-piece doors are shaped like one quarter of an orange peel. Each of the two sections weighs 600 tons and is fastened at the top by a hollow forged steel pin 17" in diameter and 6 ft long. The doors ride on 40 wheels along railroad tracks and take 5 minutes to open.
